Being in a relationship on Valentine's Day is great for many reasons.


You get spoiled for the day by your significant other. That may sound greedy and all, but it is nice getting gifts and attention. You get a free excuse to be cheesy.



son. My advice is don't do it," Norman said.


However, some people think talking to someone can be a good thing.

We got there late on Dec. 29 and decided to get up early on the 30th to go explore.



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ing the round, teammates have to be coordinated as well as communicate with each other at all times to have the best odds of winning. The team that communicates the best normally wins the round.

Once the individual wins or loses the round, that individual is placed on the opposite side.

When the individual switches sides, that individual must once again select one out of 21 different operators. The individual goes on and repeats the same process again but while on a different side.

There are a total of 42 operators between offense and defense that are split into 21 separate operators and this is why the individual picks from one out of 21 operators in the beginning of of each round either on offense or defense.

Young directors flub films

The hiring practices of film studios like

Disney, Sony and Fox are greatly flawed. Each of these studios make large films with budgets of hundreds of millions of dollars and they take young or new indie directors that do well on smaller productions then throw them into these large projects.

Now some can handle this -your Taika Waititi's and others like him -- but throwing directors who are used to having almost complete and total control over

their films and the vision they use to sculpt the pictures into a place where a lot of decision making is based on statistics and what can appeal to a mass consumer audience can be jarring and lead to adverse effects.

The worst that has ever really come out of hiring practices like this is the kerfuffle that was the troubled production of 2016's Fantastic Four film nicknamed as Fan4stic.

The problems that arose come from Josh Trank, an indie director who had only one film under his belt before being selected to make this multi-million dollar tentpole film in a cinematic universe that had yet to take off.

There was a lot riding on the film to perform well.

The direction Trank wanted to take the film was a more dark rendition of Marvel's "first family." There was an emphasis on surreal Cronenberg-esque body horror, that would for sure not play well to a general audience.

Big cuts were not made by the studio until after principal photography and right before the actual production of film where they cut three big action set pieces and added a lot of lighter humor that made the film tone deaf.

Which lead to Trank getting angry and taking that frustration out on the production of the film. Which in turn lead to integral

scenes not being shot and at least \$20 million being spent on reshoots. That and Trank generally acting very unprofessional and childish, lashing out at many people on set, and rarely showing up for a shoot sober enough to properly do his job.

A lot of the blame was placed on Trank for the failure of the film, and some of it was deserved, but not all. Studios commonly get cold feet last minute and then push reshoots and reedits and try to salvage a film that may not be inherently broken and they wind up adding more stress on people already stretched so thin and it just piles into a huge mess and millions lost.

M. Night Shyamalan is a director who found great success in the late 90's and early 2000's with his "thought provoking" films that always end in some sort of twist.

The main consensus is that Sixth Sense and Unbreakable are the only films he ever made that did not fall into the usual trappings of your modern M. Night films, that being an overly verbose script with a lack of convincing dialogue and a pretentious air that permeates the picture up until some plot twist at the very end that tends to make the film somehow even worse.

And I completely agree, his films were highly flawed.


God, were we wrong.

Watching Glass was like watching someone relapse. Split was indicative of M. Night's flaws as a writer and director, but it was a step in the right direction as far as him getting better. I am highly critical of his films, but Split is as close as M. Night has ever gotten to his earlier caliber of work.

Glass was six steps and a couple bumbling trips in the wrong direction. The film is devoid of any passion or general care from anyone working on the project to produce an above average product.

The acting from Bruce Willis is a prime example of this. He looks as if he'd rather be asleep in his trailer in just about every scene he's in, and I have no idea whether to attribute this to Willis being lazy and not wanting to put the effort in or perhaps it was Shyamalan's notoriously poor direction that ruined his performance.

The reasons I greatly disliked Split are just as prevalent in Glass, but to a more extreme degree. M. Night is so inept as a script writer and a director that whatever tension he puts in his scripts is destroyed by his inability to correctly direct an actor



within a given scene. The saving grace of Split was James McAvoy's amazing performance, but he simply cannot carry an ensemble piece like Glass all on his own.

The next steps are getting proposals from architects and talking to the Whitney Field Improvement Committee. There are three bids from turf companies, and marketing plan donors want to help. It should be about an eightweek process, Schlotterer said.
