As the end of the school year approaches, we are beginning the formal process of creating class lists for the coming school year. This is a lengthy and complex process. In this school district the staff will spend many hours preparing class lists that are balanced and contain a mixture of abilities and behaviors in order to form a heterogeneous or mixed learning environment.

We believe that parental input is important. Please describe your child's learning strengths and needs and the type of classroom environment in which you feel your child best achieves on the following form. If you wish to name specific names, please list two teachers whom you believe will equally meet your child's needs. The deadline for this process is <u>June 1</u>.

When we enter into the class list process, parent information will be considered as an important factor. However, all factors are considered in creating an effective learning environment. This may require the assignment of students to classrooms other than the ones requested by parents.

Some things we consider when creating the classroom:

- Assign students to teachers who can best meet individual student's needs by matching teaching and learning styles.
- Structure classes to be heterogeneous.
- Assign an equal number of students to each section of a given grade level.
- If possible, distribute an even number of boys and girls to each classroom.
- Group students who work well together.
- Separate students who do not work well together.

	Auditory: Auditory learners benefit from traditional teaching techniques. They learn well when directions are aloud or information is presented and requested verbally. They remember facts when presented and requested verbally. They also remember facts when presented in a poem, song or melody.	read
	Auditory learners like to: tell stories and jokes; to play word games and to use tape recorders. Teaching methor for an auditory learner might include: reading out loud together; encouraging them to read out loud when they study; studying with a partner so they can "discuss" the answers and writing a sequence of steps to solve a problem and then saying steps out loud.	is
	Physical (Kinesthetic) : Physical learners learn best through movement and physical manipulation. They like find out how things work and want to touch, feel and experience what they are learning. Most kindergartners a physical learners and by first or second grade their learning styles change to visual or auditory. But, some studies that physical learning throughout their formal education and through adulthood.	re
	Physical learners may also need to manipulate, handle and try things out; they may have a shorter attention sp needing to move while learning and for you to show them things instead of telling them about it. Teaching methods include: letting them participate in science or math labs; creating and participating in plays or dramat productions; going on field trips; creating skits or dances. They need to be encouraged to take notes, make diagrams and models.
